HAPPY AUTUMN ON THE TRAIL!



Another busy season of trail use is winding down. Once again, the Westmoreland Heritage Trail has been used by many thousands of residents (see trail counter article on page 5 for details). Plans are moving forward for more winter trail use (page 5) and a new Gateway Arch in Saltsburg (page 8). We also continue to make slow but steady progress toward connecting the trail between Export and Delmont, with statements of interest expected from engineering firms in December for preliminary work near Route 66.

Our summer fund-raising events were successful, including our 2nd Annual Poker Run, our summer Bike Raffle and the 4th Annual Ted Hayes Memorial Run/Walk in August sponsored by the Hayes and Shearer Families in support of our future maintenance building.

Thanks, as always, to our many trail members for your continuing support. Our strong membership numbers help when we submit requests for funding to charitable foundations and government agencies. Please spread the word to friends and neighbors who also use our trail. A small donation of membership dues helps us out in a really big way!

TREE FALLS AND FALL LEAVES

The summer months have given our maintenance volunteers plenty of practice cleaning up large trees across the trail. Several came down in the first half of the summer, when tornados roared through the Penn Township re-



gion. Although no twisters hit the trail itself, several trees came down in the associated windstorm. Later in the summer, rainstorms brought down more trees in Loyalhanna and Salem Townships.




Our all-volunteer maintenance crew sprang into action within hours of getting the report of a downed tree, cutting up the trunks and hauling away the branches. Helpful trail users also joined in, which was much appreciated by our workers.

As the leaves begin to turn, our maintenance crews will be blowing leaves off the trail to keep the packed limestone from getting slippery when the winter rains set in. Please be sure to give them room to work if you see them — and don't forget to tell them: **"Thanks for all you do!**"




The Westmoreland Heritage Trail is managed by the Westmoreland Heritage Trail Chapter of the Regional Trail Corporation, a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization. Eight municipal partners (Trafford, Monroeville, Penn Township, Murrysville, Export, Delmont, Salem Township, and Loyalhanna Township) work with over 300 active chapter volunteers to maintain and monitor the trail. Other trail partners include the Westmoreland County Bureau of Parks & Recreation and the Westmoreland Conservation District.



JACK MAHER GIVEN LEWIS AWARD FOR EXCEPTIONAL SERVICE

Each year, the Citizens Advisory Board and Westmoreland County Bureau of Parks & Recreation hold a Green Luncheon where they give out awards for outstanding contributions to the county. This year, former WHT board member and treasurer, Jack Maher, received the Lewis Award for Exceptional Service. WHT TRAIL COUNTERS REPORT RECORD TRAIL USAGE IN 2024

The Westmoreland Heritage Trail has measured trail usage for several years. The data will be used to support future trail development and regional connections to the Great Allegheny Passage via the Turtle Creek Connector Trail. Dan and Kathy Sigg, long-time WHT chapter members, took over the responsibility of trail counting from WHT President Stan Rudge this year. Kathy reports: "Stan gave us a pretty good process for downloading the data. There are sensors at three locations on our trail. Interestingly these sensors are the same ones that are used on the Great Allegheny Passage (GAP). We find the differences in usage on the various sections of our WHT to be very interesting (being former engineers we love data). We are huge fans of biking and the WHT. We are pleased to be able to volunteer in this way."

NEW THIS WINTER — REST FACILITIES TO STAY OPEN ON THE TRAIL!

In an effort to be responsive to the needs of trail users, the WHT will keep two of our portable rest facilities open throughout the winter this year - one at Saunders Station trailhead and the other at the Sara Steel trailhead. The restrooms at the Roberts Parcel trailhead in Murrysville will be open as usual and those at the new Export Historical Society Visitor's Center are scheduled to open from 7 AM to 7 PM on weekends between Oct 1 and April 1.



A GATEWAY ARCH RISES IN SALTSBURG



The Coal and Coke Trail follows the railroad corridor of the Southwest Pennsylvania Railroad, originally operated by the Pennsylvania Railroad. The line was built to service the numerous coal mines and coke ovens that operated here in the 1900s. In the future. it may be extended south to ioin the GAP Trail.





The mission of the Westmoreland Heritage Trail is to manage and maintain the trail from Saltsburg to Trafford, in partnership with like-minded groups, Westmoreland County Parks, and the associated municipalities the trail passes through. The trail will be promoted for walking and biking activities and for recreation, education, volunteerism, tourism, and historic and environmental conservation.
